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### **BULUH IN THE CITY**

On January 18, The Rimba Project in collaboration with Urban Biodiversity Initiative (UBI) held a day-long event focusing on bamboos in urban landscapes at University of Malaya's very own botanic garden, Rimba Ilmu which is the only university garden that sets aside a large area for conservation and nature education activities. On top of being declared as a National Heritage Site, Rimba Ilmu boasts the largest bamboo collection site in the country with 40 spp. of bamboos including the giant bamboo. 'Buluh in the City' saw a warm reception as about 70 members of the public from varying ages came to further learn about bamboos, a common plant that is often overlooked in urban contexts.

Sembang Buluh, a forum on urban spaces and community interaction with gardens kicked off the event as panelists Angela Hijjas of Rimbun Dahan and Khim Joe of Kebun-Kebun Bangsar along with moderator Thary Gazi Goh of UBI discussed on the current situation of green spaces in urban cities of Malaysia. As local spaces are becoming more marginalised and green spaces are being pushed to the fringes, all parties ranging from individuals and communities to NGO's and landscape architects should work together to cultivate better urban green spaces that serves the public's interest. Key takeaways are power of community-led efforts, value of awareness and education, importance of meaningful interactions with nature and utility over aesthetics in gardens. It was an engaging and relaxed discussion that brought meaningful dialogue on matters close to the hearts of the community.

There were multiple sessions of Bamboo Guided Walk where knowledgeable volunteer guides shared insights on local bamboos as they guided participants around the bambusetum area of Rimba Ilmu. As there is a lacking in knowledge of bamboos among the public, increasing the participants' awareness and understanding of the useful and easy-to-grow plant allows it to be viewed from a new perspective.




Balqis Tajalli of Sunprint Studio ran multiple sessions of suprinting workshop that utilises the sun to produce cyan-blue prints. Participants foraged the grounds of Rimba Ilmu and imprinted plants by process of cyanotype to produce artworks of their own. The workshop intersected nature with art letting participants engage with the plants around them in a meaningful way.















A Zero Waste Corner booth was set up as an experiment to reduce water usage and prevent water pollution in the pristine stream of Rimba Ilmu. Dried bamboo leaves were used clean food waste and oil from containers.


#### How likely are you to attend future events run at Rimba Ilmu?
