## MAKING NATURE'S BLUEPRINT

Balqis Tajalli is an architecture graduate of Korea National University of Arts and manager of DiKaki Sunprint Studio, an art studio focusing on production of sunprints. Sunprints are photographic prints made with the help of sunlight. The subjects of these prints can range from In this interview session, Balqis started off with sharing how she as an artist is adapting to MCO.

As she gave the audience a demonstration on the sunprinting process, she shared the history of cyanotype and briefly explained the chemicals used. The audience got to know the basics of the process like the solutions and materials used, the ratio of the mixed compounds, and the required duration of sunlight exposure. Balgis noted some tips and findings from her personal experience of doing cyanotype sharing that time and weather affects the richness of blue in the final outcome. Besides that, solutions should be disposed by flushing them down the toilet as to not harm the surrounding environment. Balgis also touched on other light-sensitive dyes as she introduced the audience to anthotype, which is an eco-friendly option compared to cyanotype. However, anthotype does not possess the same archival quality.



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#### "How does sunprints play a part in nature conservation?"

The archival quality due to cyanotype slow degradation process provides a method for archiving and studying plants. Balqis first approached The Rimba Project to collaborate and run a workshop on sunprinting with a twist of integrating nature education in the event. The workshop was part of an event known as 'Buluh in the City'. Participants of the event gained knowledge on various aspects of the plants they forage from the forest floor. Examples are such as the different adaptation of plant parts like seeds, fruits, and leaves, and numerous species of ferns in the Rimba Ilmu Botanic Garden.

A highlight of the Instagram live stream was the studio tour Balqis gave as she showcased some of the sunprint products she has created. It includes lampshades, hand fans and tablecloths. She also briefly discussed the role cyanotype has in the local art scene and talked about her current research project concerning natural dyes and inks.

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
